Providing accurate agriculture books to educate today's youth



OKFB WLC, Oklahoma Farming and Ranching Foundation now accepting donated crops for Bushels for Books program

As wheat harvest continues across the state, Oklahoma farmers are invited to donate bushels of harvested crops to the Bushels for Books program.

A partnership of the Oklahoma Farm Bureau Women's Leadership Committee and the Oklahoma Farming and Ranching Foundation, the program each year accepts donated crops and monetary contributions to provide Oklahoma schools with bushel baskets of agriculture books.

To donate harvested crops, farmers present a completed Bushels for Books form to their local co-op or grain elevator to designate the amount of bushels they wish to donate to the program. Forms may be found on the foundation's website at www.OKFarmingAndRanchingFoundation.org/bushels-for-books.

Educators and schools may apply to receive agriculture books from the program by completing and returning the application

by September 14. The books cover various agriculture topics and are chosen by the OKFB WLC from the American Farm Bureau Foundation for Agriculture's book library.

The books will be presented to educators during the 2018 OKFB Annual Meeting on Nov. 17 in Norman, Oklahoma.

YF&R now accepting applications for youth leadership conference

The Oklahoma Farm Bureau Young Farmers and Ranchers Committee is now accepting applications for its Oklahoma Youth Leading Agriculture program held July 23-25 in Oklahoma City.

OYLA is a unique three-day summer leadership conference designed for high school students completing their senior year in 2019.

The conference will include special leadership classes, exciting speakers, team building, fellowship, and visits to agriculture-related industries. Selected students should be among the top, well-rounded students in their class, and should have an interest in furthering their education at the post-secondary level.

OYLA participants will stay in Oklahoma City with conference activities located at the OKFB home office and around the Oklahoma City metro area.

The cost to attend the conference is \$100 to be paid by the county Farm Bureau.

House lawmakers eye late June for second attempt at 2018 farm bill

With the House's failure to pass the farm bill in mid-May, a second vote on the legislation will likely be pushed to late June. Meanwhile, Senate Agriculture Committee Chairman Pat Roberts is said to be targeting early June for his panel to begin work on its version of the measure.

American Farm Bureau Federation President Zippy Duvall said farmers across the country were quick to share their confusion and outrage over House lawmakers' rejection of the Agriculture and

Nutrition Act of 2018 (H.R. 2).

"They are facing very real financial challenges," Duvall said in a statement. "We call on all members of Congress not to use farmers and ranchers as pawns in a political game. The risk management tools of the farm bill are too important, particularly at a time of depressed farm prices. We urge the House to pass H.R. 2 as soon as possible."

OKFB President Rodd Moesel also was disappointed in the House's rejection of H.R. 2.

"The commodity and conservation programs within the farm bill provide stability to our state's farmers and ranchers that directly impacts their planning and everyday business decisions," Moesel said in a statement. "The farm bill's failure creates an unreliable business environment for farmers and ranchers in an already struggling farm economy."
